The air ambulance pilots asked us if we would like to see inside the helicopter while they were

take off. It was a cold and misty day with low cloud and they explained that if they flew above the cloud, the temperature would drop and there was a risk of the blades freezing. The area for the medics and patient is very compact, but warm and well-kitted out with life-saving equipment.

In contrast, the pilots' area is small and cold and the pilots often have to wear thermals! One of the pilots proudly told us he took over from Prince William who used to fly the same helicopter!

It's All Greek To Me

n ancient Greece, a calendar in one city state, e.g. Thebes, differed from another, e.g Corinth; but for one month of the year there was near unanimity, with the period around the winter solstice being named after the sea god, Poseidon. During Poseidon, there was a greatly anticipated festival called Poseidonia, comprising sixteen days of partying when the wine flowed freely and gifts were given. As is the way of partygoers, there were wild celebrations and drunken debauchery.

Here I turn away from recorded history and enter the field of speculation.
Could it be that the ancient Greeks, recovering from Poseidonia, felt a little jaded? Could it be that they resolved not to party anymore, to live good and pure lives thereafter, and make their bodies their temple, so to speak?
Possibly. In my musings I checked the

Latin for resolution. It comes from resolutio, which, scholars argue, could have two meanings, one is a slackening, a sort of unbinding; the other is more complex: res (thing) + o (a cry of surprise) + luti (a lot of muck) + o (surprise, surprise), which amounts to 'quelle surprise, the whole things turned to s**t'. Which is roughly what happens to my resolutions every year.

So not much joy there. Then I experienced a Eureka moment: I decided hereinafter to always steer clear of any resolutions. And that, dear reader, will remain my firm promise. *Alex Reeve*

A History of the Ukulele by Mary Curtis

he ukulele is a small 4 stringed instrument which is currently very popular across all generations, but do you know its origins?

In 1879 Portuguese immigrants travelled from Madeira to Hawaii to work in the sugarcane fields. They brought with them their lute type instruments called machetes. The Hawaiian Gazette reported that "Madeira islanders recently arrived here and have been delighting people with nightly street concerts". The Hawaiians, loved the machetes and King Kalakaua promoted it into performances at royal gatherings.

The Hawaiians adopted the instrument and called it a ukulele – which roughly translates as "jumping flea" due to the

rapid movement of the players fingers. It was popularized in the U.S. in around 1915 and used in Vaudeville and films, and soon became an icon of the jazz age.

In 1929 the ukulele was introduced into Japan and had rapid success, despite western music being banned during World War II. In the U.K. in the early 1920's the ukulele gained popularity, with well known stars and musicians playing. Its popularity waned in the mid 20th century due to the rise of the guitar – which was louder and more complex.

But in the 1990's it made a huge comeback, and is now played all around the world, and taken seriously as a versatile instrument used for many musical styles, by classical and popular musicians.

From time to time you may well receive an email purporting to be from another u3a member or committee member. The message is usually brief and asks a simple question like "Are you available for a chat?"

To check if the email is from the person you think it might be click on the emailer's name. This will reveal who really sent the email – no doubt a person or an email address you do not know!

Immediately DELETE the email and DO NOT REPLY as this provides the scammer the opportunity to open a chain of emails to you offering or demanding something. This could eventually lead to a request for your personal or bank details so DELETE THE ORIGINAL MESSAGE!

The crossword was successfully completed by Jennifer Beard and Jane Eden and the answers were as follows:


