
was prepared and which cuts were used. Once the meat was inserted into the pie, the pastry lid was added and secured to the sides with finger/thumb manipulation and water. A hole was pierced in the lid to allow steam to escape and for the jelly to be added.

There was no baking, but our chef had some pre-baked pork pies at the ready which he cut and handed round; everyone appeared to enjoy them.

After the demo we were given a voucher to purchase pork pies at Ye Olde Pork Pie Shoppe. This gave everyone an appetite so we headed back to the coach which took us to a lovely restaurant for our lunch.

The afternoon was spent driving around the beautiful countryside and through some lovely old villages with our guide describing the history and answering questions. We eventually dropped our guide off at the railway station and we headed for home, reflecting on a very enjoyable day.

Jesus College also has free access to the grounds and the chapel where we saw some beautiful stained-glass windows. There were numerous statues in the grounds, far too many to see all of them in our short time there. The location meeting was deemed a success and it is hoped that we might organise another similar walk in the summer.

Each monthly session has a "learning" section and a photographic theme; after refreshments we view members' themed photographs. 


